This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision, and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

### Part A: Curriculum music

At St Bernadette's we plan our music curriculum to ensure all children:

- have the opportunity to sing and play tuned/untuned instrument in each unit of work. They are given the opportunity to play as a class.
- We follow the Sing Up music scheme of learning to ensure effective progression. An overview of Music at St Bernadette's and progression documents can be found on our school website. The Sing Up Scheme is delivered by a music specialist who works for one day a week. The scheme provides lesson support for each year group in the school. It is ideal for specialist and non- specialist teachers and provides lesson plans, assessment, clear progression, and engaging and exciting whiteboard resources to support every lesson. The Scheme supports all the requirements of the National Curriculum.

#### How the Scheme is structured -

- Each unit of work comprises the of strands of musical learning which correspond with the National Curriculum for music.
- Listening and Appraising
- Musical Activities
- Warm-up Games
- Optional Flexible Games
- Singing
- Playing instruments
- Improvisation
- Composition
- Performing

Our music curriculum is informed by the Sing Up music curriculum and children receive a minimum of 45 minutes of music per week for 3 half terms a year.

Children have the opportunity to sing and play tuned-untuned instruments in each unit of work.

- EYFS and KS1 children take part in annual Christmas Nativities.
- We also perform songs in regular Parish Masses.

### Part B: Music tuition and choirs

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

1:1 and small group instrumental lessons are offered by both our music specialist and Bury Music Service mostly during lunchtimes but with some lessons taking place in the afternoons. These lessons include violin, guitar, brass, recorder and piano.

The school runs an out of school choir which runs weekly for children from Year 4 upwards.

Families are signposted to Bury Music Service via the website, Music service visits and staff recommendations. The Music Service visit the school once a year to demonstrate the use of different Musical instruments and perform for the school.

Children have sang and played instruments in a showcase that is performed for parents once a year.

# **Part C: Musical experiences**

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

EYFS and KS1 take part in a Nativity performance each year. Other assemblies and performances are planned in across the year including class assemblies and leavers assemblies. The choir sing in the community throughout the year including a local supermarket and local care home.

All children from EYFS to Year 6 either have a visit from a pantomime company or visit a theatre to watch a performance.

#### In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

- Development of staff CPD by taking part in the Sing Up lessons modelled by the music specialist.
- Develop links with local primary and secondary schools within the Trust.
- Invest in an App that allows the children to compose using IT
